

EYFS Home Learning Pick and Mix Challenges

We would like you to **complete at least 5 challenges** and **provide evidence of these on Tapestry** so that we can see the wonderful learning you are doing at home! You can complete more if you wish. Mrs Hockin and Miss Sweetman will keep an eye on Tapestry and look forward to seeing your completed challenges.

<p>Make a model using junk such as empty boxes and pots. What can you make? How did you make it? Was anything about making your model tricky and what did you do about it? Take a picture of your finished model. Can you write some sentences to go with it?</p>	<p>Can you build a den? Use sheets and pegs to make your den. Once you have finished it, can you write a sign to tell people about your den? You could even share stories in your den too!</p>	<p>Go on a coin hunt and collect together all the loose coins in your house. Can you sort them into different types of coins? What is each coin called? How much is each different coin worth? Can you make a toy shop and practise buying toys with the coins you've found?</p>
<p>Be a technology detective. With a grown-up, can you find all the things in your house that need to be plugged in or turned on to work? Make a list of the things you find and which room of the house they are in.</p>	<p>Using the number cards 1-20 that you were given at parents evening, lay them on the floor in the correct order and find objects around your house to match to each number e.g. 16 socks, 5 pegs, 10 crayons and so on. Take a picture and put it on Tapestry for us to see.</p>	<p>Choose one of your favourite animals and draw a picture of it using the 'My favourite animal' page in the pack. Tell us some information about it in sentences. With a grown-up, you could use the internet to find out some facts or information books if you have them at home.</p>
<p>Use the 'My Easter Celebrations' page in the pack to draw a picture and write about how you celebrated Easter with your family. Remember to use your sound mats to help you which you all have at home. If you would like to write more than the sheet allows, ask a grown-up to draw some lines for you on the back so you can carry on writing.</p>	<p>Enjoy looking at and talking about photos with your family of when you were growing up. How have you changed? How have your mummy and daddy changed? What about your brothers and sisters? What things are similar and what things are different?</p>	<p>Can you bake something with your mum or dad? Take photos as you go and put these on Tapestry. You could even write some instructions on how to make the thing that you bake.</p>
<p>Draw or paint a picture for Mrs Hockin or Miss Sweetman all about Spring time.</p>	<p>Can you make a paper aeroplane? See if everyone in your family can make one and then have a competition to see which plane can fly the furthest. You could use a tape measure and record the results on some paper. You could even decorate your plane too!</p>	<p>Using only 20 bricks, building blocks or something similar such as lego, each family member has to make a model. At the end, have a look at how different or similar they are. You could repeat the challenge and see just how many different models you can make.</p>
